Website Login

I've written about the updated CYC website in previous columns. I hear from many members how much they like being able to make reservations online for our events, and even from a few who have used the new reciprocal club letters and found it easy to use. I've also heard from members who don't know how to login to the members-only section, where you can find the online reservations and reciprocal club tools. It is quite simple, and once you set it up, your computer should "remember" you and make it a breeze to visit the members-only section frequently.

If you have not set up your member account yet, please follow these simple instructions:

1. Go to www.calyachtclub.com.
2. Click on "**Member Login**" in the upper right corner of the web page. If you do not see "Member Login" as an option, then there will be three lines next to "Menu." Click here and it will take you to a drop-down menu. Then click on "Member Login," which will be the last option on the list.
3. If you've never logged in to the website, your username is the membership number of

the primary member. Only include numbers from your membership card - no dashes, spaces, or letters (example: 12345678).

4. If you've never logged in to the website, your password is the primary member's last name. The first letter of the last name is capitalized. Passwords are case sensitive.
5. Click "**Remember Me**" to store your password. This will allow you to view the members-only side of the website each time you visit calyachtclub.com without having to re-enter your username and password each time. You will have to do this with each device you log in with (laptop, tablet, phone, etc.) as well.
6. Click "**Sign In.**"
7. If you forget your password, click "**Forgot Password.**" An email will be sent to the primary member's email address with instructions on how to reset it.
8. You can change your username and/or password if you want. You can do this by clicking on "**Member Roster,**" then search for your name and open your profile. Scroll down and click "Edit This User." Then scroll down and you can reset your username and/or password.

Please take our new website for a test run. Find an event you would like to attend that requires a reservation, and make that reservation online. I promise you, once you start using the online reservation system, you will want to make reservations this way all the time!

Howland's Work Party 2017

On May 27, the Los Angeles YC yachts began to assemble in the cove at Howland's Landing for the annual project to clean up and improve the LAYC outstation that we now share with them on Catalina Island. A small but enthusiastic group of CYC yachts were present. This was to be expected after so short an interval between the Commodore's Cruise and this event: Rum rehab?

The recent heavy rain had created several interesting issues.

First there was the missing fire pit on the beach, which had vanished without trace. It had been flushed away by water flooding down the hillside, through the facility and out on to the sand! After five years of drought this required a considerable adjustment for people to contemplate. Parts of the breakwater footpath leading up to the barbeque had to be rebuilt and several sheds had to be rearranged.

The characteristic scrub and grass that we see as ground cover had been challenged this spring. Black mustard is an invasive plant that grows 10 feet tall and can kill much of the surrounding vegetation. Earlier in May, it had proliferated throughout the hills in this neighborhood. Now it has flowered and withered away leaving huge dark red stalks everywhere.

On the positive side, the bush and tree population now looks much better than it has for years, with vivid green leaves displayed all over the hillside. This brings us to the ongoing tree saga that we witnessed for the first time last year. Decades ago LAYC members had planted a variety of trees at Howland's for the benefit of giving the cove a lush more landscaped look and to add shade during the height of the summer. Sadly the drought had killed many of them and the fire marshall had insisted that they be removed in the spring of 2016. The hills now have a somewhat barren look but LAYC is busy with a new plan to replant trees to restore the cove to its former glory. With the approval of the Conservancy they are purchasing Catalina ironwood and toyon trees. These will be planted and maintained by the Conservancy. They will take time to mature but this is a wonderful program that we CYC members can only wish lasting success.

Sunday dawned with perfect weather for the work to begin, and begin it did around 1000. For the next couple of hours a large gathering all labored diligently over a multitude of tasks, supervised by Commodore Willard Bell and Gregg Schroff. Gregg served double duty as official photographer, creating a wonderful selection for members to enjoy in the future. Staff Commodores Tom and Mike Trujillo provided their splendid chili dogs luncheon, which really hit the spot after the morning's labors.

New Free App Helps Boaters Find Pumpout Stations



Pumpout Nav, a free iOS and Android app, helps boaters geolocate sewage pumpout stations closest to their present location. The app was developed by The Bay Foundation and San Francisco Estuary Partnership as part of a Clean Vessel Act grant provided by California State Parks Division of Boating and Waterways.

The app, designed for use while on-the-go and aboard the vessel, automatically finds the boater's location, and suggests the closest pumpout stations on a map or as a list. The app displays each facility's operational status, cost, hours, and detailed location within the marina for each unit. It also provides instructions on how to use a pumpout station, and information about the environmental risks and applicable regulations regarding sewage discharge.

If a boater finds a non-operational pumpout, that issue can be reported directly through the app. This will help boaters avoid the simple but frustrating act of docking and tying up the vessel, just to discover that a pumpout station is not working.

Pumpout Nav is now available as a free download from the Android Play store and iOS Apple store.

CYC Women Head to Chicago for Spring Match Racing Invitational

We've all heard Chicago referred to as the Windy City, and this May we took a team to Chicago Yacht Club to decide that for ourselves. Club members Marilyn Cassedy and Britni Belcher-Schroeder, with teammates Jennifer Arrington and Patricia Lapadula, were invited to participate in a "Cliegatta" run by top US Women's Match Racers Stephanie Roble and Maggie Shea that coincided with their Spring Match Racing Invitational. The event featured a day and a half of coaching, followed by a day and a half of racing on Lake Michigan.

The city lived up to its moniker on Friday as we contended with heavy rain, 20- to 30-knot winds from the east, and a chilly 40-degree temperature. The conditions kept us inside Belmont Harbor and prevented us from flying spinnakers as we dodged mooring balls and anchored boats. Nonetheless, it gave us a chance to put into practice our pre-start, dial ups, and tactics for working around obstructions.

Thunderstorms and rain kept us in the classroom Saturday morning, where crew positions and responsibilities were discussed, as well as more pre-start strategies. Once out on the water, we contended with 5- to 7-foot chop and 15- to 18-knot winds - very different than typical Santa Monica Bay conditions! Going into the second race of the day, the wind had already started to lighten, and at the first top mark, it completely died. The light air and confused waves meant that

after a couple of hours of drifting, racing was abandoned and we headed in for some Chicago deep dish pizza!

The third morning brought another, completely different set of conditions: partly sunny skies, flat water, and a sustained westerly breeze at 10-15 knots. We were treated to beautiful views of the Chicago skyline throughout the day, and exhilarating, close racing. In the early afternoon, the wind kicked up and we saw big shifts coming from the shore at 20-25 knots. We were in eighth place going into a best-of-three knockout round, and managed two consecutive wins against the fifth place boat. We lost in the next single-elimination round, leading to a sixth place overall finish.

As a new team with only one member who had previously match raced, we were happy with our performance. Each day brought an increase in our knowledge, teamwork, and skill level, making this a great learning opportunity. The racing itself was a thrilling experience that made us all better sailors. Our next adventure will take us to another women's invitational event at St. Francis Yacht Club in July, so stay tuned!

We want to thank Dockmaster Evan Davis, S/C Tom O'Connor, Marylyn Hoenemeyer, Norm and Bari Belcher, Will Tetric, Henry Brawner, and Alan Field for their help in our practice session. Also, thank you to the CYC Competition Fund and Santa Monica Bay Sailing Foundation for their financial contributions that made our trip to Chicago possible. ⚓

Fisher Memorial Trophy Awarded to S/C Tom O'Connor and Marylyn Hoenemeyer

S/C Tom O'Connor and Marylyn Hoenemeyer were awarded the SCYA George L. and Kay B. Fisher Memorial Trophy by Southern California Yachting Association Commodore Simon Decker on May 14 at Del Rey Yacht Club. This award recognizes a couple for distinguished service to yachting in Southern California over a long period of time.

Tom and Marylyn have been involved in the SoCal sailing and racing community for nearly 30 years, beginning when they moved to Los Angeles and took an ocean sailing class to meet new people. They are racers and have taught seminars, coached race clinics, chaired regattas, and served on the Area B PHRF Board and as PROs for numerous events at CYC, Association of Santa Monica Bay Yacht Clubs, and South Bay Yacht Racing Club. One of their most important contributions



to Santa Monica Bay racing was the establishment of Course Chart 16 (since updated as Course Chart 17), which lays out more than 20 possible race courses using the permanent spar marks in the Bay, used by every yacht club in Marina del Rey for at least one of their races each season.

Among her many contributions, Marylyn is especially proud of her efforts in growing Cal Race Week, CYC's signature buoy racing event. She started in 2004 with about 65 boats sailing on two courses, and peaked in 2008 with 123 boats on three courses. Tom is widely recognized in Marina del Rey as one of the area's best PROs, and has acted in this capacity in several national and North American championships. Both Tom and Marylyn have been commodore of SBYRC, while Tom was the ASMBYC commodore in 2002 and CYC's commodore in 2010.

Tom and Marylyn are truly one of the dynamic duos of the SoCal sailing scene. What began for them in 1987 as a way to meet people in their new home has truly turned into a life-long commitment to service in the yachting community. ⚓

Know Your Sunset Series Perpetual Trophies!

MILLARD ROSING PERPETUAL TROPHY

Awarded to the Winner of the Cruising Division

2016 Winner: Ron Jacobs, *Duchess*, Del Rey YC

Sailboat racing today in the Santa Monica Bay in many ways reflects the early leadership of Millard Rosing. Rosing was commodore of the King Harbor Yacht Club in the early 1960s and was one of the organizers of the Association of Santa Monica Bay Yacht Clubs (ASMBYC), where he served as commodore in 1967. An active racer of both dinghies and high-end keelboats, he went on to become commodore of CYC, the Southern California Yachting Association, and the Pacific Coast Yachting Association. But his most enduring accomplishments were undoubtedly in

the leadership role he played in shaping Santa Monica Bay sailboat racing. Early on, he recognized the need to separate cruising boats from race boats and he devoted countless hours in making that happen in the Bay's best-attended racing series – CYC's Sunset Series. He helped craft the early rules for the cruising class and worked continually to refine and shape the growth that the class has come to enjoy. The Millard Rosing trophy, which he donated, is the first perpetual trophy to be deeded exclusively to cruising class racing in Southern California. †

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Magic Carpet Ride Through the BVIs

A flotilla of 115 sailors aboard 18 boats followed the leadership of Commodore Kellie Fennessy on a magical Commodore's Cruise through the British Virgin Islands April 29 through May 7.

Crews flocked to the Caribbean by Saturday, and boarded their chartered boats that evening in Road Harbour on Tortola. 





Smiley Brings LAPD Closer To Home in Crime Novel "Pacific Homicide"

CYC member Patricia Smiley's fifth novel, the first in a new series set in and around Westside Los Angeles beach cities and featuring female police officer Davie (Davina) Richards, was the standout attraction for an overflow crowd at our June 1 Book Mates luncheon. Introduced by SEO Dawn Sprout, the author was present to reveal the genesis of "Pacific Homicide," and its plot and characters, based on events from her 15-year stint as a volunteer for the LAPD.

Smiley's fascinating presentation began with a chronology of events that led to her decision to become an author. An avid reader from childhood and a drama major at the University of Washington, she came to Los Angeles to pursue an acting career, but turned to writing after reading several mystery novels, especially Susan Isaacs' "After All These Years." She developed her craft, first at UCLA, and later in a group mentored by internationally famous mystery author Elizabeth George.

An opportunity to work with a senior lead officer (SLO) linking the local community with the LAPD launched a 15-year association that evolved from secretarial duties to actually following up on leads from cold cases, one of which involved working with the FBI. During this time, Patricia penned four novels, all published and widely praised, featuring amateur female private investigator Tucker Sinclair. Smiley toyed with the idea of writing about the LAPD, but out of respect for her co-workers, she did not seriously approach the subject until she retired from her volunteer role.

Her writing process does not follow any detailed outline. Often characters, including the actual killer, develop and change

as scenes emerge. "Pacific Homicide" begins with an actual cold case situation and her protagonist and antagonists are all based on real people in or connected to the LAPD. Authenticity is an essential element of her books and short chapters create added suspense. A sequel, "Outside the Wire," is due out in November, and she is now working on a third Davie Richards police procedural.

Our July 6 fiction work is the Pulitzer Prize-winning bestseller, "The Underground Railroad," by Colson Whitehead. The New York Times called it "A potent, almost hallucinatory novel ... Whitehead has told a story essential to our understanding of the American past and the American present." The Washington Post called it "A triumph." The Wall Street Journal hailed it as "Powerful and profound." Randy Sprout moderates.

Our August 3 novel is "The Circle" by Dave Eggers. The Boston Globe described it as "Biting, chilling, even vicious at times. Author Eggers raises timely questions about transparency, privacy, democracy, and the sinister side of the Internet." Susan Allan moderates.

Our September selection is the best-selling "A Gentleman in Moscow" by Amor Towles. Connie Webster and Walter Germond will moderate.

And he was right – they did!

Leslie Bene and David presented each of the five courses with interesting facts about the ingredients, and Sommelier Dick Hyman presented the six wines with tasting notes and interesting facts about the wineries they came from. We began the evening in the Fireside Room with Schramsberg Blanc de Blancs sparkling wine from Calistoga, then moved upstairs to the beautifully appointed dining room.

After toasts to our country and the sport of yachting, led by S/C Cheryl Mahaffey and S/C Rick Turner, and the introduction of dignitaries and guests, Society General Chair Susan French inducted Rob and Susie Hammesfahr into the Society, giving them a warm

welcome and the traditional sash and Epicurean bracelet.

The feast began with a California seafood trio appetizer with Santa Barbara spot prawns, a Bodega Bay oyster and Dungeness crab served between two

slices of watermelon—all delicious! Leslie told us that spot prawns are really shrimp with an interesting sex life. They begin life as males and at age two become females. The 2015 Epoch Estate Wines Epoch White from the Willow Creek District of Paso Robles nicely complimented the course.

Local halibut served with Stockton asparagus, a green almond, and vanilla braised endive was the second course, along with the 2012 Far Niente Chardonnay from the Napa Valley.

After a lemon sorbet palate cleanser, made from Meyer lemons grown in Chef's backyard, came Ojai heritage pork belly that had been braised for 72 hours in kombu-dashi, served with a quail egg, rosemary polenta, Gilroy garlic chips and a port wine glaze. The wine choice for this course was the 2013 Muscardini Cellars Unti Vineyard Syrah from the Dry Creek Valley.

A Sonoma lamb chop with Central Valley spring succotash and sunchoke coulis, served with the 2013 J. Lohr Fog's Reach Pinot Noir, Arroyo Seco, from Monterey, made a fabulous fourth course.

And then came the cheese! Cowgirl Creamery Red Hawk from Marin County, Marin French Cheese Schloss from Novato, and Bellwether Farms Pepato from Petaluma, went really well with the 2014 Bella Union Winery Cabernet Sauvignon from Rutherford in the Napa Valley.

Royal Cup Dakota Roast coffee from Birmingham Alabama, the only non-California product of the evening, was served with a mini California wild strawberry almond cake to finish the dinner. Leslie and David chose the coffee because they started their collaboration on this dinner when they discovered that they

had each spent some time in the American South. Although they started out with the idea that the dinner would reflect a southern theme, as they worked with Chef Christian, their idea evolved to a celebration of California's spring—which turned into a fabulous feast enjoyed by all who attended.


