CYC Junior Rowers Among Nation's Best

he speed our CYC junior rowers showed early in the season was just an indication of what was to come. At the country's premier youth regatta, the USRowing Youth National Championships, CYC entered three events and came away with three medals. The top CYC finish was in the boys youth quad where the team of Luke Holscher, Peter Albrecht, Keaton Lynch, and Harrison Zeigler took the silver medal just 6/10ths of a second out of gold. It's worth noting the gold medal boat was the four-time defending champion with four seniors in their boat. CYC's quad had two sophomores and two juniors so it's not hard to imagine them coming back next year on a mission to win.

Dominique Brattesani and Alexandria Lange took bronze

in the girls youth double while Theory Millar took bronze in the boys youth single. The Nationals took place June 6-9 in Sarasota, Florida. Qualifying for Nationals is an accomplishment in itself, with many clubs not qualifying any boats. There are as many as 36 entries in our events at Regionals and only the top three from each region are invited to nationals.

At the USRowing Southwest Regional Championship, CYC won the varsity boys quad, varsity boys single, varsity girls double, novice boys quad, and novice girls quad. CYC also finished second in the boys lightweight double and girls varsity single. The regional competition was held May 3-5 on Lake Natoma, California. $\mathbf{\Phi}$


Over On-the-Water Photo Contest Winner







or the first time ever the Martin 242 North American Championship was held in the waters off beautiful Orcas Island, June 29-30 in Washington State. The Orcas Island Yacht Club did a spectacular job of welcoming 27 M242s, the regatta's biggest turnout since 2012. Boats traveled from Vancouver, BC; Victoria Island, Washington; and California to compete. Mike George, on his boat All In (307), won it for the fourth time. His team consisted of fellow CYC member Alan Field, Jennifer Hylander, and Jennifer Arrington. Michael Clements (Royal Victoria YC), a three-time winner, was second overall, and longtime M242 sailor Alex Fox (Royal Vancouver YC), a two-time winner, placed third.


Mike and his team worked hard for their firstplace finish in light, shifty conditions. Ten races were scheduled and going into the ninth race Mike George and Michael Clements were tied on a drop-race basis, but Mike managed to escape from a terrible start and lined out to the right side of the course for a win, while Clements finished fourth. Clements' aspirations ended when he followed up with a 12th in the final race to Mike's fifth place.

Mike reflected on his experience: "The Martin 242 class is like family and it is always great to see old friends. I was really proud of our team; everyone worked hard and stayed focused, whether it was prepping the boat, strategy on the course, or basic boat handling. We stayed consistent and got better and better each race."





Epicurean Dinner Features New France

he Epicurean Society's Spring Dinner, chaired by the Epicurean steering committee and Epicurean Chair, "New France, French cuisine from the New World," featured New France-inspired food from the New World such as Arcadian (Cajun) from New Orleans and New Brunswick, as well as other New French foods from Quebec, the Upper Peninsula of Michigan (UP) and the Great Lakes/Midwest. Our fete delighted Epicurean members and guests with a kaleidoscope of what makes French food French. Not specific dishes as we have become accustomed to identifying as French cuisine, rather what truly makes French cuisine "French cuisine," incorporating the freshest of local ingredients and regional tastes prepared in time-honored French style. This style, featuring layering flavors and the French cooking methods of either flambéing, sautéing, poaching, brazing, or broiling/grilling was brought to the New World and New France by French settlers, explorers, and missionaries. Epicurean Sommelier Harlan Gibbs introduced and explained the various wines that accompanied each course, well selected by Food and Beverage Director Steve Bell.

At the opening reception, we enjoyed seared scallops and bacon étouffé en croute (New Orleans), well-aged pike rilletes (Upper Peninsula), and zucchini and tomato verrines (Ontario, Great Lakes) accompanied by Chateau Langlois Brut M. Then, Chapoutier Côtes du Rhone Blanc 2017 was served as the pairing for a truly spectacular soup course, a vibrant green spring pea soup (Ontario, Great Lakes, Maritimes) with wild chive blossoms, sautéed morel mushrooms, and wild mushroom dust, the perfect light and tantalizing spring rendition of the typically heavy and hearty New French split pea soup.

The salad course, consisting of duck leg confit (Quebec) and spring green salad with mache, watercress, and baby arugula served with chive balsamic vinaigrette, was paired with a crisp and slightly tangy/sweet Pieropan Soave Classico 2017.

In keeping with the finest of local ingredients, and a mainstay of the Maritimes, Quebec and Ontario provinces, and the UP, our entrée was seared loin of venison with parsnip purée and fiddlehead fern, and Canadian rainbow baby potato hash. The Rizzi Barbera D'Alba 2016 balanced nicely with the flavors and textures of the entrée course.

While awaiting our dessert, the Society acknowledged Chef Fabio and staff as well as General Manager Michele Underwood and Steve Bell for their tireless efforts in making this Epicurean dinner a success. The Society also inducted new member Bob Congdon into the fold. Our dinner concluded with a traditional new French dessert popular in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan through the Great Lakes region, strawberry and rhubarb crisp in a chocolate tart shell with a Quady 'Essencia' Orange Muscat 2016.

At the conclusion of dinner, Society members retired to the Members Lounge for cordials and cognac and whimsical beignets!

I am looking forward with much anticipation to our annual holiday dinner event to be held on Tuesday, December 10. Our chair for this event will be S/C Kellie Fennessy who will be assisted by her husband, legendary sailor and regaler of sailing exploits, Mike Priest. Stay tuned for more details on upcoming informal Epicurean Society events to be held this fall, Wednesday, September 25, and Wednesday, November 6. \clubsuit



Book Burners Can't Extinguish the Life of The Library

he devastating fire that almost destroyed the Los Angeles Public Library on April 29, 1986, is the catalyst from which best-selling author Susan Orlean crafted "The Library Book," a thrilling journey through time that reveals how libraries provide so much more than just books and why they remain an essential part of the heart, mind, and soul of our country. This master journalist's reminder that, perhaps especially in the digital era, books are more necessary than ever was at the center of our July 11 Book Mates discussion luncheon.


Moderator Dawn Sprout did her own research, taking photos of the current completely rebuilt Los Angeles Public Library and leading us through a spirited member participation that often touched on personal memories of experiences at libraries, past and present.

One of the most surprising revelations was how few people remembered the fire, a fact caused by the headline-stealing news of the Chernobyl disaster the very same day. The author, as she did in her best-seller, "The Orchid Thief," tries to understand the causes of the crime and the suspected perpetrator of the fire, Harry Peak. She even went to the extreme of burning a book herself. Some who associated such destruction with the Nazis or "Fahrenheit 451" were intrigued by the author's research into so many periods in history when books were burned.

What everyone found so fascinating was how Orlean weaves the story of the city's great library into the story of Los Angeles itself; along the way she introduces us to an unforgettable cast of characters - from Mary Foy, who in 1880, at 18 years old, was named the head of the Los Angeles Public Library at a time when men still dominated the role, to Dr. C.J.K. Jones, a pastor, citrus farmer, and polymath known as "The Human Encyclopedia" who roamed the library dispensing information; from Charles Lummis, a wildly eccentric journalist and adventurer who was determined to make the LA library one of the best in the world, to the current staff, who do heroic work every day to ensure that their institution remains a vital part of the city it serves. The knowledge that the book would be made into a movie was met with the hope that these historical figures would play a prominent role rather than the cinematic rendering of the fire itself, which only occupies a few pages.

Dawn suggested that we visit the Los Angeles Public Library as a group, Arrangements were discussed.

For September 5, we will discuss "The Island of Sea Women," by best-selling author Lisa See. Sue Moore will moderate. \clubsuit




