





One World Championship Was Unbelievable - Winning Three in a Row Was Unimaginable!

ou might recall that a year ago when CYC was kind enough to host an event for our team winning our second straight Melges 20 World Championship in Italy, I was asked what was next. My response was that we had sold our entire Melges 20 program in Italy and that our team was on to the Farr 40 and our soon-to-be-built Melges IC 37 (which was launched mid-summer). With the Farr 40 World Championship in the home waters of Long Beach, we had to give it a shot with our aging *Far Niente* (a 20-year-old Farr 40 but a past world champion in 2002). In our wildest dreams we never thought that we could win three straight world championships – our third October in a row celebrating victory.

Our secret to winning the past two Melges 20 World Championships was simple: Practice harder, train more frequently, and race in more events than our competition. These principles served us well over the past few years. Unfortunately with the Farr 40, we did not have this luxury due to prior commitments. We came into the 2019 Worlds having raced our boat for four days in 2019 (including the Pre-Worlds), and seven days total, since we purchased the boat a few years back. Add to that a total of five additional practice days, and you have a team that had not sailed together very often, competing against some teams that have sailed their boats for many years.

To combat that inexperience and lack of preparation, we knew that we would need to prepare very efficiently to beat

these well-prepared and -sailed boats. With the help of our boat captain, we made sure the boat was updated and prepared as well as possible, with the bottom sanded, needed gear replaced, and a complete inventory of new North sails added to the boat. We then went about getting not only our friends to join us, but sailors with the most Farr 40 experience we could find. This included Ben Allen on the bow, Max Hutcheson at the mast, Kayla McComb floating, Jake LaDow in the pit, Charlie Smythe trimming downwind, Jon Hayes trimming upwind, Eric Doyle trimming the mainsail, and, of course, my partner, Vince Brun, calling flawless tactics. Add to that our coach, Ed Adams, and we had a formidable team.

After an inauspicious start to our Worlds prep, finishing third in the Pre-Worlds, just days prior to the Worlds themselves, we knew we had work ahead of us. The good news was that our coach, Ed Adams, arrived for the second day of the Pre-Worlds. He was one of our secret weapons ... Ed was our eyes outside of our boat. It was his job to learn from our competitors: film their set-ups, watch how they were trimming and sailing their boats. What we lacked in experience we were going to make up by learning from our competitors.

After two solid days of practice between the Pre-Worlds and the Worlds, continuing to learn the boat and improve our boat speed, sail handling, and maneuvers, we were as ready as we could be for the event with the limited amount of prep time we had. The regatta began with atypical light air for Long Beach but built to a nice 13-17 knots by the end of the third race. We had yet another less than auspicious first day, finishing with a 3-7-1, but ended on a high note, winning the last race by a substantial margin as the breeze picked up. We definitely had more and more boat speed and were beginning to feel a bit more confident that we could hang with the leaders.

The second day remained relatively light. These conditions suited *Struntje Light*, with them taking the "picket fence" for the day (1-1-1). It rapidly looked as if we might be racing for second at best. We began the third day 12 points out of the lead (with more than double the points of *Struntje*). After three clean starts toward the windward end of the line, we had the flexibility to break free and head to the favored right-hand side of the racecourse. Our boat speed continued to improve as we had multiple evenings to review Ed Adams' pictures and learn from his observations and insights. My driving also continued to improve, making our boat speed more formidable by the race. As we broke free from the pack in each race, *Struntje* was not so fortunate, getting pinged around and pushed back. After we finished 3-1-1 to their 5-9-5, our 12-point deficit somehow turned into a two-point lead in one day.

As we headed into the dock, we looked at each other in amazement. We were somehow now leading. The good news is that the prior three Melges 20 World Championships taught us how to deal with pressure. Rather than be stressed, we felt fortunate to be in the lead and knew that we simply had to sail clean and just match *Struntje* in the remaining two races to win the Worlds. The Farr 40 Worlds does not allow for a drop race, making things a bit more difficult.

The breeze for the final day was forecast to remain in the high single digits. We began the first race in our usual fashion – a nice clean start towards the boat end of the line, while *Struntje* was not able to get off the line as cleanly as we were. We then

tacked on to port approximately two minutes after the start and led the fleet right. *Blade 2* had tacked right at the gun, and therefore led at the weather mark. We simply stayed with *Struntje*, trying to tack on her and push her back whenever we could. Our tactics paid off – we finished the race in second, while they finished fourth. Our lead was now four points with only one race left in the series.

As this was the last race in the series, John Busch, the PRO, surprised the fleet with a three-lapper. This made us a little uneasy because we still felt that *Struntje* and *Insanity* both had a boat speed edge on us. The longer the race, the more we could be exposed.

Surprise – we attempted the same start again and were fortunate to pull off another clean start, towards the boat end of the line, with *Struntje* pinned below us. After sailing on port for approximately three minutes, we tacked to starboard, protecting the right. *Struntje* eventually tacked on our hip, but rapidly fell into our line as the right was favored once again. We rounded the top mark in third (both *Edake* and *Skian Dhu* were able to break to the right early and gain substantially). We remained in third for the next four legs. It was only on the last downwind leg that we let *Struntje* pass us as it became evident that we had the series in the bag. We stopped covering them because we didn't want to slow both of us down further as the rest of the fleet gained on us both. They passed us right before the finish line but it was mission accomplished – we were somehow crowned the 2019 Farr World Champions.

Looking back, I am not really sure how we pulled this off. We had a solid boat, new sails, and a great team, but lacked the experience of our toughest competitors. I was definitely the weak link on the team. We had amazing tactics, often laying marks from many boat-lengths away. Our team came together at just the right time, and as we all know, to win a world championship always takes an element of luck. \clubsuit

ires and Santa Ana winds. While most of the country was indoors fretting over keeping the house warm, here in Southern California we were experiencing summer heat and record winds blasting out of the desert which had triggered serious wildfires throughout the area. However, the various marine forecasts for Long Beach suggested very, very light offshore winds for the regatta, held November 2-3. Looking out to sea from the Belmont Pier racing area you could see that there was an ugly brown layer of wildfire smoke obscuring Catalina Island and, for a period during the afternoon, thick fog reduced local visibility to half a mile.

California Dreamin' Series Long Beach Yacht Club Stop is the final of three match race events with the others sailed at San Diego YC and St. Francis YC. Saturday began with a postponement but, fortunately, when the light breeze did fill in, the wind was from the southwest. For several flights the breeze actually built to provide excellent conditions for the competitors and these Grade 3 matches were hotly contested. By the end of

the first day, the favorites were ensconced at the top and we had round robin one completed as the wind died to nothing. The last match saw the dying breeze shift in alarming fashion, demanding great courage by the tacticians as they closed to the finish line.

Sunday morning and again the wind remained light and from the southwest, but, thankfully, it didn't die until we had completed the second round robin. CYC skipper Liz Hjorth had a stellar day on the water which raised her team to fourth overall in a fleet of eight. The results included tie breaks for second and third, and a three-way tie for fifth, sixth, and seventh. CYC skipper Marilyn Cassedy enjoyed some excellent close matches with lead changes, although the scores do not reflect this.

The weekend was won by local sailor Shane Young (Long Beach YC), with Chris Weis (Del Rey YC) second, and Greg Dair (Cabrillo Beach YC) third. The overall California Dreamin' Series was won by Chris Weis (Del Rey YC), with Liz Hjorth third, and Marilyn Cassedy fifth. \$\dphi\$



Thank you to SEO Karen Stirling for organizing this event! Everyone said, "Let's do it again next year!"









A Remarkable "Educated" Journey of Survival, Identity, and Forgiveness

Tara Westover's deeply personal memoir, involved, angered, and moved every Book Mates member at our December 5 luncheon. After a Champagne holiday toast and gifts for the year's moderators, Randy Sprout moderated the discussion and launched us into Westover's survivalist family world with an insightful video interview with the author.


Westover's recount of how she found the strength to change her own life became a runaway bestseller, recommended by people such as Bill Gates and Michelle Obama. Randy questioned the significance of the book jacket art, informed us of his own experience writing a college dissertation, and asked each of us to explain the title. SEO Norma Pratt expressed it best, "It's about the cost to arrive at a place in your life where you finally know who you are."


Despite Westover's insistence that her work wasn't about Mormonism or any religion, it was hard to ignore the impact of those beliefs. The abuse she suffered, emotionally from her parents and physically from one of her brothers, was a major topic. But many had believability issues with some of her experiences. What did she hide? What did she embellish?

SEO Bill Watkins was intrigued by the author's use of a quote from Virginia Wolfe – "[T]he past is beautiful because one never realises an emotion at the time. It expands later and thus we don't have complete emotions about the present, only about the past" – and one from educator John Dewey about the continuing reconstruction of experience.

This story, remarkable as it is, might be merely another entry in the subgenre of extreme American life, were it not for the uncommon perceptiveness of the person telling it. "Part of me will always believe that my father's words ought to be my own," she writes. If her book is an act of defiance, a way to set the record of her own life straight, it's also an attempt to understand, even to respect, those whom she had to break away from in order to get free.

Our February 6 selection is a work of historical fiction, "The Giver of Stars," by Jojo Moyes. Gail Guglielmino will moderate. March 5 we will read "Winter Garden," by Kristin Hannah. SEO Dawn Sprout moderates.


