
The weekend was a nice getaway from our homes and everyone enjoyed the warm water, a bit of nature, and seeing friends and families with a bit of distance.






#### "The Farewell" is a Welcome Surprise While "Cold War" Lacks Heat

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



## J/70 World Championship - Same Time, Next Year

ne hundred J/70s, their skippers, crew members, coaches, and well-wishers descended on CYC for their annual World Championship regatta.

Preparing to race for the top trophy in one of the world's most competitive one-design classes, teams from 20 nations were greeted with ideal sailing conditions in Santa Monica Bay – 10 to 12 knots of wind, gentle ground swell, tepid water temperature – and, of course, CYC's renowned hospitality.

Of course, COVID-19 intervened! This long-anticipated, first-ever J/70 Worlds in Southern California was not to be in 2020 and the gleeful announcement, above, never went to press. Flying the AP (postponement) flag early, the class leaders wisely rescheduled this championship to the same time next year, August 7–14, 2021, again with CYC as host.

But, this has been a year of cancellations. SoCal J/70 racers were looking forward to a tune-up on the Worlds racing course at our Cal Race Week, normally scheduled the first weekend in June. Even a two-month

postponement of Cal Race Week proved insufficient, so the first weekend in August suddenly became empty. Taking advantage of increasingly familiar pentup demand to go sailing, CYC skippers Jeff Janov and Jim Murrell organized a group sail for 11 local J/70 teams.

And a high-powered group sail it was! The three coaches have several world champion titles between them: Judd Smith, 2018 J/70 world champ, of Doyle Sails; Eric Doyle, Star world champ, of North Sails, and familiar face in SoCal regattas; and Willem Van Waay, 2017 J/70 world champ and last year's J/24 world champ. Saturday and Sunday sessions included chalk talks before heading out and full debriefs after returning to the Club. On the water there were plenty of practice starts and several short-course races, with coaches pulling alongside the boats to offer observations, tuning tips, and racing techniques.

Uncharacteristically light winds prevailed this August weekend, plus heavy fog set in Sunday morning. Not to be dissuaded, the coaches set up really short courses in the MdR entrance channel with mark roundings every two minutes until the fog lifted. But the experiment was successful, indeed. This was an owner-sponsored and organized event, supported by CYC providing trailer storage, docking space, socially distanced meeting areas, and access to our outside bar and food service for the visiting sailors. This weekend proved to be a great model to use during COVID-19 delays on how to run a group sail following the rules. All sailors wore masks at the Club and followed social distancing protocols.

The feedback from all involved was very positive, and plans are afoot to repeat this format the weekend after Labor Day. Big thanks to GM Lindsay Pizarro, Dockmaster Curtis Wagner, CYC J/70 skippers Jeff Janov, Jim Murrell, Curt Johnson, and Rich Festa, V/C Tim Clarke for loaning a coach boat, J/70 fleet captain Bruce Cooper for promoting participation, and local legend Bruce Golison for providing, along with Jeff Janov, his J/70s Worlds coach Judd Smith, to kick this off. Look for lots of J/70s at CYC as next year's World Championship draws closer.



The summer weather has been perfect Southern California sunshine, the prevailing westerlies have been favorable, and we've enjoyed six full weeks of sailing. Masks on and six feet apart, this crew consistently marches on in perfect COVID-19 safety sync to sail singlehanded in Optis, Laser Radials, and the RS Tera. Staff coaches Patrick Mulcahy, Ryan Janov, Julia Rychlik, Robert Bloomfield, and coaches-in-training Junior Rychlik and Tot Davis have led the instruction all summer long.



#### On Any Given Day

Robert's Level 2 Reachers have had lots of daily fun and sharpened their sailing skills as well. On any given day they might be charting their course through the marina or found picnicking on the sand bar in the main channel on their way offshore. Friday is fun day and the signature treasure hunt remains a popular favorite. Moving forward, several sailors are moving up to Optis, while others have their eyes set on the CFJ, waiting for the day we can sail them once again. Next summer, with the hopes that COVID-19 is a distant memory, everyone is excited to add the Muddy Feet Regatta back into the schedule.

#### **Coaching Highlights**

Under coaches Ryan Janov and Patrick Mulcahy, our Laser sailors have made excellent progress mastering a physically challenging boat. While most are new to the class, they've quickly adapted to the radial rig. Our coaching strategy has been to focus on both Laser technique as well as tactical racing skills. In addition to Ryan and Patrick, we've featured several notable guest coaches. First in line was CYC junior sailing alumnus





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and U.S. Naval Academy Cadet Gavin McJones. Gavin actively campaigns his Laser at the academy and is a key member of the Goats sailing team.

We've also been fortunate to have championship coaching from Quinn Wilson. Quinn's esteemed sailing career includes a USODA West Championship and many other notable titles in the Opti. In the 29er skiff, Quinn has been a Youth Worlds champion and has now garnered multiple championships on the Hydrofoil Pro Tour.

Other brilliant coaches in the queue include recent Harvard graduate and multi-collegiate title champion Lucy Wilmot. Lucy is currently campaigning a 49er FX competing for a position in the 2020 Olympics, to be held in Tokyo in 2021. Lucy's current FX partner, Erika Reineke, will also be coaching at CYC this fall. Among many other titles Erika has been a Single-handed National Champion, four-time Women's All-American Collegiate Champion, three-time Quantum Women's Sailor of The Year, and ILCA Youth World Champion.

Last, but certainly not least, we are scheduling several weekend clinics with pro sailor, race tactician, and legendary youth coach Steve Hunt. I have also been fortunate to have the partnership of Olympic 49er coach Willie McBride. Willie's experienced guidance has been invaluable to me and the long-term development of our coaching acquisition and development program.

#### Opti Sailing at the Core of the Program

In the world of Opti sailing, our elite coach Manny Resano and I have had some quick success in revitalizing our Opti Champ and Opti Green Race Fleets. The Opti is the fundamental core of any great junior program. With strategic selection from our recreational classes and some careful recruitment

from around the bay we have brought more than five new sailors to our Champ Fleet. Congratulations to our returning skippers, Katlia Sherman and Lexie Bugacov, and congratulations and welcome to our new Champ team skippers, Landon Delancy, Reed Knight, and Kaito LeToux.

Our development efforts continue, and other sailors will likely be added to the Champ Fleet as we transition into the fall schedule. One of the additional benefits of our renewed focus on the Opti is a resurgence of Opti sailors at a variety of skill levels. In the weeks to come we plan to announce a Green Fleet roster with a full complement of new sailors. While racing remains postponed until 2021, we have a tremendous opportunity to do some comprehensive training and team building.

#### **Announcing Beginner Sailing**

Our final highlight for the summer has been the launch of our re-tooled Beginner Instruction Program. With a focus on private lessons and rapid entry into a single-handed boat we have



reengineered the sailing fundamentals to work effectively and still be COVID-19 correct. Our first student, seven-year-old Brack Calvin Dornberg, is already skippering his boat with newfound knowledge and skill after just three classes.

The course is structured as 10 three-hour private lessons which includes several land lessons in the RS Tera followed by a swim test, capsize drill, and then we are off to sail the channel. Classes are normally scheduled for the light winds of the morning. Students should expect to skipper their own boat within the second or third lesson. Instructors are always positioned close by to lead the lesson and monitor safety. Lesson curriculum



includes points of sail, understanding the wind, the science of sailing, common knots, parts of the boat, sail trim, and more. Thus far, the results are promising, and we are actively adding classes to the schedule.

As of early August, we have more than six students in the program and we will continually add more class availability through the summer and into the fall. In a short time, we plan to transition our beginner sailors into a whole new Level One Reachers class. It is imperative to get the juniors together to enjoy the essential group sailing experience that is the foundation of beginner sailing and often one of our most cherished childhood memories.

#### Still to Come

Still in the planning stages is our Keelboat Program and a Cruisers Club for seasoned junior sailors who love the sport but prefer sailing without the intensity of competition.



# Privilege, Success, Friendship, Relationships, and Motherhood Race Through "Such A Fun Age"




ne of the many pleasures of Book

book you've read through different

August selection, "Such a Fun Age," moderated
with insight and intelligence by Susan French.
Kiley Reid's debut novel delivers a satirical
commentary on race relations and selfcongratulatory white feminism, eviscerating
"woke" culture.

Susan led the discussion based on what she felt were the three main themes of the novel: money, awkward moments, and memory. Many felt that the white character, Alix, was driven entirely by success. Her compulsion went too far when she tried to control the life of Emira, her Black babysitter. Alix was definitely not on any reader's most liked list.

Of the many awkward moments, two stood out. In the opening scene, Emira is accused of kidnapping a white child in a supermarket; this sets in motion a series of events that will have long-term consequences for both Emira and Alix. When Alix invites Emira and her new boyfriend for dinner, she discovers that he, Kelly, is an old flame, who ended their relationship in college in a manner she will never forget or forgive.


The use of social media to make people famous or destroy them was discussed at length. Still, out of Reid's often cloying vernacular, there emerge some surprisingly resonant insights into casual racism in everyday life, especially in the America of the liberal elite.♥
