

CYC Rows into the New Year

YC has a long history of rowing starting back in the 1930s when the Club was based in Wilmington in Los Angeles Harbor. The CYC rowing programs in 2021 encompass a much wider range of ages and goals. We have rowers as young as 11 years old and some still active into their 80s. Many of our participants row for fitness instead of, or in addition to, going to a gym. We also have a large component who train very rigorously and compete in regattas.

It's a surprise to most to learn CYC has about 60 adult rowing members and about 70 juniors. Most of our rowing takes place in the early to mid-morning which may explain the surprise. Rowing lessons for young and older are offered to those wishing to learn the sport or for those who are experienced and wish to improve further.

Although a smaller program in terms of numbers, the CYC Junior Rowing Program is among the best in the country and has consistently won medals at their two most prestigious regattas: the USRowing Youth National Championships and the Head of the Charles Regatta.

CYC junior rowers are currently rowing for and have been recruited by all the finest universities and rowing programs in the country. Currently, the list includes Harvard, Dartmouth, Brown, Penn, Columbia, Cornell, Tufts, Colgate, and many more. CYC junior rowers have also gone on to represent the U.S. at the World Championships.

For juniors on the younger side or for those who wish to row but not join a competitive team, a recreational rowing program is offered. The general pathway for juniors is to start in middle school with lessons and progress to the recreational rowing program. Once in ninth grade, those from the recreational rowing program may move up to our novice competitive team and from there, once in 10th grade, move onto our varsity competitive team.

New 50-Boat Fleet Arrives at CYC

Fifty – that's how many brand-new racing sailboats arrived at CYC in January. Fifty brand-new DragonFlite 95s. It was a big order – although each of the radio-controlled boats is only 37" long.

The DF95 is a hugely popular international class, with big Southern California fleets already racing in King Harbor, Long Beach, Newport Beach, and San Diego. Still, the CYC order was the largest ever placed by a North American yacht club, and our new armada will also be supplemented by eight additional DF95s already owned by Club members.

The CYC fleet purchase was put together in less than 30 days by Alan Field and Doug McLean, who've been racing Wind Warrior RC boats for many, many years. They were looking to step up their game with a more contemporary, performance-oriented design. So, they tested the water, hoping to find enough interest for a yacht club fleet

purchase. They really had no idea how big this was going to get.

DF95 Fleet Captain Alan Field is now planning clinics for the new fleet members and a very full regatta schedule, plus weekly evening races in a new Funset Series ... once the COVID-19 restrictions are lifted. In the meantime, it's not uncommon to see individual members of this new fleet showing up at the guest dock in small numbers - tuning up their shiny new radio-controlled sailboats as they get ready for what promises to be a very fun summer. \clubsuit

CLIFFORD ROME Charles F. Hathaway Long Distance Cruising Trophy

ver the last 48 years, Clifford Rome has cruised more than 235,000 ocean miles on two boats, first for 20-plus years on his Hinckley, *Omeray II*, sailboat on which he logged 60,000 miles, and now on *Oasis*, the 70' Delta Trawler that has been berthed at CYC, on which he has traveled more than 175,000 ocean miles during the last 28 years.

Cliff has cruised *Oasis* to four continents: Africa, South America, Europe, and North America, and has transited the Panama Canal six or seven times. His most memorable cruises have been in Alaska, Norway, and the Mediterranean. He



everything by experience and has earned a 500-ton offshore license. Cliff has never broken down underway, or been delayed from a departure more than an hour. He has built boats, including Charles Hathaway's trawler, *Starr*, and worked on the *Oasis* build.

One example of Cliff's ingenuity and spirit is the large bulb at the bow of *Oasis* with the Batman insignia on it. Naval architects claimed a bulb such as this would not work on a boat less than 100 feet long. Cliff decided to give it a try and tank-tested a wave-piercing bulb of his own design. The bulb on the bow of *Oasis* can hold 500 gallons of seawater and helps keep the bow down in large seas. It also improves fuel efficiency 25%. The



has been at dock in five hurricanes and at sea at the tail end of Hurricane Sally.

Over the past approximately eight years, Cliff has journeyed to the Pacific Northwest, Alaska, the East Coast between Florida and Newfoundland, Europe, and the Mediterranean. He says the Med is the most difficult place to moor and skipper due to ancient marinas, bad power, and other issues.

Cruising is Cliff's passion and he thrives on skippering his boat and maintaining it. He has learned Batman insignia on it came from his daughter who really liked Batman at the time.

Cliff and his family have been members of CYC for 48 years and have traveled to faraway lands with CYC Honorary Commodore Charles Hathaway and Patty, and Tim and Risa Yeiser.

For the near future Cliff and *Oasis* plan to cruise the Pacific Northwest, Alaska, and Vancouver, British Columbia. When asked how long he plans on continuing his cruising, Cliff says: "When I stop waking up at 0500 excited, engaged, and passionate to challenge myself and greet the day. There are more places to see, experience and explore than we have time." It is this sense of spirit, individuality, adventure, and vast miles journeyed that makes CYC proud to award Clifford Rome the Charles F. Hathaway Long Distance Cruising Trophy for 2020.

warding Yachtsman of the Year would seem challenging in a pandemic-curtailed sailing season. Helpfully, Drew Freides solved this dilemma by neatly bookending the pandemic induced break within the award selection period with achievements that would be extraordinary in any season, or indeed in any career; a World Championship in the Farr 40 and a National Championship in the Melges IC37 (there is no world championship yet in this class because it is so new). This is the fifth time that Drew has been named Yachtsman of the Year for his remarkable and continuing success in one-design racing.

Drew and his team on Far Niente won the Farr

Drew's third consecutive international one-design world championship.

Drew then turned his attention to the new Melges IC37 class. In a partnership with Bill Ruh, Drew purchased hull #22, and began the process of learning yet another new boat and building yet another new team. This endeavor got off to a great start as Drew's new *Pacific Yankee* debuted with a sweep of the Melges IC37 2019/2020 Winter Series, sailed in the waters off Fort Lauderdale, Florida. *Pacific Yankee* won the first two regattas, sailed in November 2019 and January 2020, before the third event scheduled for March 2020 was canceled.

After the extended break in racing, Drew and *Pacific Yankee* resumed racing in September 2020 at

40 World Championship, sailed October 2-5, 2019 in the waters off Long Beach. Trailing by 12 points after six races, Far Niente gained their first lead in race nine. the last race of the penultimate day of the regatta. Extending and then managing that lead on the final day left Far Niente with a comfortable margin over the second place Struntje Light of Germany, the 2018 world champion. Having won the Melges 20 World Championship with his team on Pacific Yankee the previous two years, this was

New York Yacht Club Race Week at Newport, sailed in the waters off Newport, Rhode Island. The team finished in a strong second place in this regatta, despite having to retire from one race due to a pre-start collision with the eventual winner. Drew said, "Our goal this year was to win the Nationals, and we were hungrier than ever after the disappointment. We came into the regatta more focused than ever and knew what we had to do to win – stay clean, avoid unforced mistakes, and let our boat speed and crew work speak for themselves."

The 2020 Melges IC37 National Championship was sailed the following week, October 2-4, also in Newport. Drew and the *Pacific Yankee* team proceeded to put on an exhibition of sailing dominance and consistency. *Pacific Yankee* led the entire way, building a virtually unassailable lead during the first two days of racing, with their lowest finish (and throwout) being a third. In the final day, Drew and *Pacific Yankee* were able to take it easy and were crowned the 2020 National Champions by a comfortable 13-point margin.

n ways both large and small, Port Captain Susan Service has throughout the past decade generously shared her unique skills, energy, and Corinthian spirit to the benefit of CYC and the sport of sailing. Most recently as chair of the Sail Competition Planning Committee, working to attract highprofile championship regattas to CYC; as Sail Committee Chair in 2015 and 2016; as organizer and chair of multiple CYC regattas; and as an always-willing volunteer and problem solver for all of the Club's efforts on the water, Sue is a most worthy recipient of the Michael F. Braney Sportsmanship Award for 2020.

Sue's positive impact on the sport has been recognized in the past. Named ASMBYC Yachtsman of the Year in 2018 for her creative contributions to and exemplary accomplishments within the sport of

sailing, Sue also received SCYA's Peggy Slater Memorial Award in 2015 for her outstanding contributions to the enhancement of women's participation in sailing and her individual achievement in the sport. In 2014, the CYC Women's Association honored Sue with the CYCWA Fleet Service Award for



her contributions of time and service to the Club.

Sue's behind-the-scenes efforts have time and again provided critical support to CYC racing at every level. She partnered with external developers to integrate and customize CYC's online registration program, and regularly lends her skills and expertise to the Club's scoring team. She is a yeoman volunteer on race committees, whether as principal race officer or markset crew, as need demands. She serves on the Club's Race Documents Committee, has helped organize Sunset Series protest committees, compiled and tabulated historical wind data, and chaired marquee CYC regattas, including Cal Race Week in 2019, the 2018 CFJ Nationals, and 2017's Laser Midwinters West.

Sue is an avid racer and has competed in all the major Southern California regattas, as well as Key West Race Week and St. Francis Yacht Club's Big Boat Series. She has crewed in numerous Linda Elias Memorial Women's One Design (LEMWOD) regattas including CYC's winning efforts in 2013 and 2019. Sue is a staff commodore and active member of the Women's Sailing Association of Santa Monica Bay (WSA-SMB).

Whether she's on the water racing, organizing high-profile regattas, sighting a start line for race committee, or helping new members find a home at the Club, Sue has made a significant positive impact on sailing in our community. \clubsuit

Congratulations, Stephanie, on your well-deserved honor. $\pmb{\Phi}$




THOM PAGE SCYA Warren Ewert Memorial Trophy

he long-time service of Madeleine and Justin McJones to the wider sailing community of Southern California, through three yacht clubs, is extensive and noteworthy, and welldeserving of the honor of the Fisher Memorial Trophy.

Madeleine and Justin McJones have been active in the Southern California yacht racing community since the early '90s. Madeleine joined Cabrillo Beach YC right after college, and Justin joined Los Angeles YC in 1993. They met while racing and were married in 1995; their ceremony and festivities spanned both clubs.

Justin served two years on the CBYC board of directors in the late '90s, and Madeleine built a new website for LAYC and served as its webmaster for several years. LAYC presented her with its Emmett Harvey Exceptional Service Award in recognition of her contributions.

Their children, Jessica and Gavin, started racing in the Optimist class, which at that time was just gaining momentum in Southern California. Madeleine started California Optimist Association of Sailing Teams (COAST) to encourage participation in and visibility of California Optimist action, relative to the national USODA which was more centered on East and Gulf Coast sailing.

Justin and Madeleine also started Midwinters West, now part of the SCYYRA Carrie Series. This event was held in its first years at LAYC and was timed to be on the three-day weekend before the SCYA Midwinter weekend, so parents could join their children for racing and then go out on their big boats the second weekend. It also allowed families from Northern California enough time to drive down and participate. As part of the initiation of this Opti regatta, Justin and Madeleine oversaw the re-deeding of three LAYC trophies for this event: the McNeil Dinghy Series Trophy, the Iroquois Optimist Dinghy Trophy, and the Warren D. Wood Optimist Dinghy Trophy.

Justin was elected to the LAYC board of directors in 2006 and started on the bridge in 2009. He was LAYC

commodore in 2012. He was LAYC's representative to the Association of San Pedro Bay Yacht Clubs (ASPBYC), and both he and Madeleine were involved with SCYYRA for many years. Madeleine created the website for the 2014 USODA National Championship, held at CYC.

The McJones family joined CYC in 2015. Justin has been an active member of the Junior Committee and is the CYC representative to SCYYRA. Both he and Madeleine have been active in race committee and the Junior Program, assisting with towing club trailers to away regattas, and hosting out-of-town juniors for the annual CISA clinic.


Madeleine arranged for an advanced Laser coach from Portugal, Miguel Andrade, to work with CYC racers during two summers. Miguel stayed at the McJones' home and shared his excellent coachingwith Laser sailors from San Diego to Ventura at CYC. That resulted in SoCal juniors participating in regattas as far away as the Columbia River Gorge and Kiel, Germany.♥

MARIE ROGERS SCYA Peggy Slater Memorial Award

arie embodies the spirit of Peggy Slater, in both her numerous accomplishments on the water, and in her dedication to enhancement of women's participation in sailing. She is a skilled sailor and a U.S. Coast Guard Master Captain. She has long been an advocate for bringing sailing to the larger community and for inclusivity and diversity in the sailing community.

Marie's commitment to community sailing includes developing the Los Angeles YC Community Sailing Program, where she spearheaded efforts to introduce a diverse set of adults and "I children to sailing. She is passionate about inclusivity and is chair of the first-ever of ar inclusive boating committee for ar SCYA. In that capacity, she secured a fleet of 16 Hansa double-handed sailboats that can be skippered by disabled sailors. N

She started LAYC's Women



on Water (WoW) program, introducing women of all ages to boating in general and sailing in particular. She has spent countless hours as a Sea Gals coach aboard Long Beach Sailing Foundation's Catalina 37s, helping women hone their sailing and racing skills. Her knowledge and expertise in helping women excel in sailing was recently recognized by US Sailing, where Marie was invited to be part of a panel on diversity, equity, and inclusion in women's sailing, broadcast as part of the "Starboard Portal" series.

She is an accomplished racer herself, both

nearshore and offshore, having completed her first Transpac race in 2019, the 50th running of the event, aboard the DK46 *CaZan*. Marie was the first sitting female commodore to complete this race.

Marie has been a CYC member since 1999 and is a member of the Women's Sailing Association of Santa Monica Bay. She is also a staff commodore at LAYC, the second female commodore in that club's history, and the first female of color to serve as the commodore of a major U.S. yacht club. She has broken many barriers in her time as a sailor, including being the first African American member in LAYC's 118-year history. She was recognized by LAYC as their 2012 Yachtsman of the Year. 💠

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The de Mille Cup

s most everyone is aware, 2022 will be the 100th anniversary of California Yacht Club. In researching the history of the Club, I came across a stunning trophy called the de Mille Cup. I know the name Cecil B. DeMille and was immediately intrigued by a possible Hollywood connection. Cecil B. DeMille (he used DeMille professionally and de Mille in his personal life) was an American motion picture producer and director, considered the archetypal American film mogul. His 70 films reflected changing American tastes and values, and he

was particularly noted for his multimillion-dollar spectacles. He was unequaled for the types of films he produced which consistently broke box office records and earned him the title "Mr. Hollywood."

In 1922, he commissioned this exceptional work of art. This article in the July 1922 issue of Motor Boating magazine (page 112) captured the excitement generated by this trophy:

A Gold Cup for Los Angeles

The handsomest and most valuable trophy ever put up in the west for motorboat racing will be contested for at Los Angeles. This is the De Mille Gold Cup, just offered by Cecil B. De Mille through the Los Angeles Athletic Club Motorboat Racing Association. Mr. De Mille, who is director-general of the great Famous Players-Lasky corporation and who for a long time had practical aviation for his principal hobby, is turning from the air to the water and enthusing over sports in the latter element, and this trophy is the result. It is generally believed that Mr. De Mille, who does everything he undertakes in a broadgauge way, will build a speedboat and get into the game himself with the object of beating all records. At any rate he is showing keen interest in the further development of the exciting sport.

The De Mille cup, already in course of manufacture,

was painstakingly designed by Paul Iribe, the distinguished French artist who has no rival and who has for years been on Mr. De Mille's art staff. The trophy will be 15 inches tall and in order to bring out the best possible effect the cup proper will be of sterling silver - a design of curling, whitecapped waves. Upon this silver sea will ride a motorboat of solid gold, apparently driven at great speed and having the appearance of a fast craft in action on tossing waters. At the base of the cup will be a gold

shield to bear the names of the winners, and in relief a flying seagull casting a golden shadow upon the cup. The base will be of exquisite Catalina Island green marble. The whole constitutes a masterpiece of its kind. It is being made under the direction of S. Nordlinger & Sons, Los Angeles.

In accordance with Mr. De Mille's suggestion the race will be an annual free-for-all, to be held the first Sunday before Labor Day in or adjacent to Los Angeles harbor; to consist of three heats to be run on the same day, each 33 miles, and the total elapsed time to determine the results – the boat making the fastest elapsed time in 99 miles winning. The first heat is to start at 11 and the others are to follow with not to exceed half an hour between. There will be a race-horse start, entrants to draw for pole, and the pole boat to start the pace not faster than the slowest boat. Entries close July 1, and entry fee \$50, to be returned to each boat actually starting.

"It gives me pleasure to offer this trophy," said Mr. De Mille, "for I am sure that the development of motorboat racing in Southern California will be of general good. The west should not be behind the east in these matters and I can think of no reason why the Pacific Coast, and especially Southern California, should not be pre-eminent in water sports. In order that the winner each year may have a more lasting memento of what I hope may be a most interesting event it will be my pleasure to provide an appropriate gold

medal which will go to him as his personal property. I hope this effort on my part will be instrumental in the development of this sport of kings in Southern California."

Pacific Motor Boat magazine covered the September 10 race in its October 1922 issue (pages 14-16):

The race was a free-for-all event under the auspices of the California Yacht Club and the Los Angeles Athletic Club Motorboat Racing Association. It consisted of three beats of 33 miles each over a three-mile triangular course-eleven laps to the heat-off the Los Angeles Athletic Club Outer Harbor anchorage. The largest crowd ever assembled for this form of sport on southern waters was there, proving that the exciting game is becoming popular. Since the Los Angeles Yacht Club consolidated with it the California Yacht Club has 1050 members and nearly 300 boats, so owners, guests and fleet made a formidable and decidedly attractive showing. Mr. de Mille, donor of the \$1000 trophy, was on hand with his big auxiliary schooner Seaward, and a hundred other private craft, large and small, rode at anchor in the blue harbor. A passenger vessel carried out a capacity load of spectators from San Pedro, and other ports sent many. Their enthusiasm was expressed in almost continuous cheering.

Reading about all the excitement surrounding this trophy and event made me think about how much we will have to celebrate in our 100th year. While this sport's popularity has faded over the years, this stunning trophy is a great reminder of the rich history that our beloved Club played in motorboating in Southern California. As we were 100 years ago, California Yacht Club remains in the forefront of the yacht racing. **‡**

"I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings," a Remarkable Work of Autobiographical Fiction

t our January meeting, S/C Bill Watkins led us in a fascinating discussion of the first volume of Maya Angelou's seven-volume autobiography, "I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings." Born in 1928, she was a poet, essayist, and writer of plays, movies, and television shows. She was awarded more than 50 honorary degrees, the Spingarn Medal in 1994, the National Medal of Arts in 2000, and the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2011. Her remarkable life is the subject of a documentary, "Maya Angelou: American Masters," that you can watch on *KCET.org*. Her life stories are described as autobiographical fiction because they include reconstructed conversations and scenes.

Bill began by asking what the title means and why she chose it. It reflects one of the main themes of the book—African Americans are caged in by white society and long to break free.

The title comes from "Sympathy," by Paul Laurence Dunbar, an African American poet who lived from 1872 to 1906. The final stanza of the poem reads:

I know why the caged bird sings, ah me, When his wing is bruised and his bosom sore,— When he beats his bars and he would be free; It is not a carol of joy or glee, But a prayer that he sends from his heart's deep core, But a plea, that upward to Heaven he flings— I know why the caged bird sings!

The book, published in 1969, covers Angelou's life from the age of three, when she and her brother, Bailey, were sent alone on a train from Los Angeles to live with their paternal grandmother in the little village of Stamps, Arkansas. Both children felt the abandonment by their parents keenly but adapted to life in Stamps where their grandmother owned the only Black-owned store in the area. At age five, she and her brother were taken by their father to St. Louis to live with their mother. After Maya was raped by her mother's boyfriend at age seven, she stopped speaking, which led to the children being returned to their grandmother in Stamps. Eventually they returned to their mother and ended up living in San Francisco during World War II.

The discussion spanned the humiliation and severe limits imposed by racism and the survival strategies adopted by African Americans, the remarkable strengths of Maya, her mother, and her grandmother, and the similes and metaphors she uses throughout the book. All agreed that "I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings" is a beautiful book that is well worth reading.

Book Mates meets the first Thursday of each month. Our February 4 book is "The Book of Joe," by Jonathan Tropper, and will be moderated by Gail Guglielmino. Our March 4 selection is "Hamnet," by Maggie O'Farrell; Marylyn Hoenemeyer will be the moderator.




