## Fingers Crossed for a Full, Action-Packed 2021 Racing Season

ell, 2020 is finally over. After 10 long months of cabin fever and canceled plans, it's a pleasure to look forward with some guarded optimism to the year ahead. And while no one can know for sure what the new year may hold in store, California Yacht Club will be ready to hit the start line at full speed with a packed 2021 racing calendar.

Topping the list will be the J/70 World Championship, to be held August 7-14. It's one of sailing's highest-profile events, with nearly 100 international teams having already qualified (including five from CYC), and racing that will feature some of the world's best sailors competing for honors here in Santa Monica Bay.

In the months leading up to the Worlds, the Club will host a J/70 Spring Series of two weekend regattas on April 10-11 and May 22-23, offering competitors multiple opportunities to familiarize themselves with the venue. In addition, the J/70s have been invited to compete for this year's California Cup, the Club's most prestigious trophy, with races held the weekend of April 30 through May 2.

Along with events surrounding the Worlds, we're planning

the Club's usual full slate of weeknight races and weekend regattas. The Starlight Series will again welcome Star sailors on Thursday nights from May 13 through August 5, and the Sunset Series will return on Wednesday nights, beginning April 14 and running through September 8 (with a hiatus August 11).

In 2021, for the first time, the King of the Hill race – featuring the Sunset Series' top racing division boats – will be run concurrently with the Cruising Championship, including top finishers from the cruising class, in an inverted-start, end-of-season, battle of the best.

Weekend racing kicks off with the SCYA Midwinter Regatta for one-design boats on February 20-21, with the Harris Spring Regatta returning on April 11. Then, on June 5-6, we look forward to hosting the 22nd running of our signature regatta – Cal Race Week. The Pacific Cup Deepwater Series – a favorite for random leg racing enthusiasts – returns for three Sunday races planned throughout the season (May 16, July 11, and September 12).

On the weekend of July 10-11, a highly competitive fleet of Star sailors will vie for our oldest trophy, the King of Spain, while other one-design and PHRF boats race round the buoys in the Summer Regatta, to be held this year on July 10.

The year wouldn't be complete without our regular complement of junior regattas, beginning with the Harken Optimist Spring Regatta on February 27-28 and culminating with the team-raced Sanguinetti Dinghy Regatta, September 25-26, and the CFJ class Shadden Series to be held October 3.

2021 is shaping up to be a year to remember – we look forward to seeing you out on the water.  $\clubsuit$

## **Moving to the Laser Class - A New Beginning**

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ovember 14-15, 61 boats competed in the Santa Barbara Fall Laser Invitational, hosted by Santa Barbara YC. There were 10 Laser Standard and 51 Radials, the class I sailed in. This regatta was my first ever Laser regatta. It was really fun to race with bigger and more

advanced boats. Because I had only sailed Optis before, it was a new and exciting experience.

On the first day of the regatta the wind wasn't in our favor. After getting one race done in very light wind, we went into a very long postponement which ended up in an A over N flag

combination: races abandoned, more signals made ashore.

The second day of racing brought us better sailing conditions and we got four races in. During the first race the conditions were light and the pin was favored at the start. I finished in 14th place. During the second race, the wind picked up and it was much harder for me to hike the boat down. I finished 44th. During the third race, the wind died just a little and a lot of seaweed came in. It was a little bit easier to hike the boat down but the seaweed throughout the course slowed

me down. I ended the race 35th. During the last race of the regatta the wind calmed down and I was able to move more freely in the boat. I had a really bad start but managed to sail fast and gain a lot of boats. That was my best race: I finished in 11th place.

Though I have sailed the Laser for just a few weeks, I have gained some great strategies and would like to thank everyone who helped coach me and to take my first steps moving to the Laser class. (more photos on page 13)

CVC Perpetual Trophies Triumph and Tradition



# The Dr. Bob Crum One Design Perpetual Trophy

hen Commodore Tim Clarke and I started delving into the various exceptional trophies around the CYC clubhouse that we plan to feature over the next two years, one in particular jumped out as the trophy to introduce first. Why begin with the Dr. Bob Crum One Design Perpetual Trophy? Well, our esteemed Commodore has himself been awarded this prestigious trophy numerous times sailing aboard Duncan Cameron's Martin 242, *Dean*. Having had the honor of holding up this trophy during an awards ceremony, what better way to kick off Commodore Tim's first *Breeze* issue.

Who was Dr. Bob Crum and what was his significance to CYC? Dr. Crum began sailing and racing in his 20s with his brother on a 28-foot Hershoff-designed sloop out of Los Angeles Harbor, before there was a King Harbor or Marina del Rey. His love of sailing included the challenges of two Transpac races, which he did aboard a PCC in the 1940s and with three of his four sons on a Santa Cruz 50 in 1981, to the more cerebral aspects of buoy racing that he experienced in one design, racing Lidos off Santa Monica Pier in the 1950s and 1960s. While his victories were many, perhaps the most memorable was winning the Schock 35 Nationals, twice.

Dr. Crum was a strong believer in the one-design concept, evident in the choice of boats he owned and raced with his sons over the years, including a Coronado 25, Morgan 27, J/30, and Olson 30. When the Martin 242 came on the scene in the 1980s, he was always willing to try something new and had eager support from his sons. Dr. Crum's commitment and unselfish contributions to the M242 class encouraged other one-design sailors to join in and helped make the Martin fleet such a strong class.

This trophy is dedicated to Dr. Crum, a CYC member since the early 1960s and true life-long sailor. It is awarded annually to the top finisher in the Martin 242 class of the Sunset Series.



"Dear Edward," by Ann Napolitano, skillfully weaves together the story of Edward's healing with compelling vignettes of the people who died in the crash. Love and loss, grieving and healing, and coping with the aftermath of a disaster are sensitively dealt with by Napolitano in this heart-warming fictional story that follows Eddie/Edward from age 12 through 18. Commodore Stephanie Weston ably led our December 3 conversation about "Dear Edward," which was well-liked by most participants.


Our January and February meetings will be:




