spectacular evening at the Bitter End Yacht Club 2.0, which had just opened in time for our arrival.



But, what was happening on Admiralty Way back then?



A Saturday was chosen to introduce her to the Club members. The crew was S/C Dean Dirks, S/C Dick Hampikian, and me. We cruised her by our members - and we wore masks of three U.S. presidents. Thus, the name!



n the 1960s, CYC's first Marina del Rey clubhouse was the first floor of the Marina del Rey Hotel.

There was a flagpole out in front of the hotel.

Several of the Fleet Council thought it needed a jack staff on the flagpole in order to properly display flags. Wade Hill (Commodore, 1967) was in need of someone willing to go up the flagpole in a bosun's chair on the flag halyard to make this happen. It was crazy to go up a flagpole on the flag halyard just to fasten the bolts on a jack staff. Oh well, youth does not know any better. I did the job with Wade's supervision for the benefit of the Club. As I remember, my legs were wrapped tightly around that flag pole.

# **Getting to Know Steve Hathaway**

Interview for the Breeze

teve Hathaway joined CYC as a youngster, in 1961, which made him a 60-year member just before the Club launched its centennial celebration. At the end of last year, Steve retired from his position as President of CYC, Inc., overseeing all the Club's operations. To recognize Steve's dedication and contributions to CYC over the decades, he was installed as an Honorary Commodore at our Installation and Awards Dinner this January. The *Breeze* chatted with Steve about his experiences growing up at CYC and growing the Club to what it is today.

# Breeze: What were your experiences in CYC's junior program back in the '60s?

SH: As a 9-year-old, all my buddies were into surfing and I was hoping my parents would buy me a surfboard. Charles got me a Sabot, instead. So, I jumped into our junior program, then operating out of the Marina del Rey Sheraton Hotel. Our new clubhouse was finished in 1966, the year I was Jr. Commodore, and the Gallery Room became our junior "clubhouse." Soon I was spending all my spare time at the Club and we were all in on dinghy racing. The Club owned some Snipes, which were fun, but I fell in love with the Finn, a hard-core single-handed boat. I raced that for several years, finishing ninth in the 1968 Olympic Trials.

Soon I was crewing on bigger boats, like the 70' *Blackfin* in the 1970 L.A. to Tahiti Race. In the late '60s and early '70s, besides the Tahiti race, I did the Fastnet Race in the U.K. and three Transpac races, L.A. to Honolulu. Closer to home, I crewed for my dad, when Charles steered his Columbia 50, *Gem*, to victory in the Club's 1968 California Cup.

# Breeze: Any favorite family voyages with Charles and Patty?

**SH:** Well, you can't beat a six-month voyage to Tahiti for a family adventure. Charles had been talking about this kind of trip for a while, so I pestered him until he and Patty actually bought a boat big enough for all of us. *Tiare* was a 64' Rhodes ketch and, by March 1978 we'd fitted her out for the trek, rented our house, and off we went. Twenty-five days later we made landfall in Papeete and spent the next few months cruising the Marquesas and Society Islands.

Tahiti was not very modern back then, so for spare parts we communicated via ham radio with Glenn Thorpe back at CYC.

On our way home we stopped in Oahu and I was even able to crew on Monte Livingston's Del Rey YC-based *Checkmate* in the fabled Kenwood Cup. One of the unexpected pluses of our trip was that I had to learn and use celestial navigation – there was no GPS back then.

#### Breeze: How about your own family's boats?

SH: As you can tell, sailing was in my blood, so I raced a Capri 30, *Pacific High*, for a couple of years, winning the overall Sunset Series prize, the Marylyn Ritchie Trophy, in 1985. Then we jumped into the Martin 242 class and successfully campaigned *Strange Crew* for several years. Stephie and I along with S/C Craig Leeds and Margie Cate were a formidable and fun team, primarily racing in the Sunset Series, and became known for our post-race parties in the dry storage lot, setting up bar on one of the whalers nearby.

Then around 2008, S/C Bill Petersen proclaimed to Stephie and me, "You need to buy a boat!" And, he had a deal for us, a Jeanneau 39 which we christened *Starr*. The cruising life definitely fits our lifestyle now and our favorite hangout is Cherry Cove in Catalina. We even belong to the Cherry Cove Yacht Club!

# Breeze: How about rowing – that was a very visible passion?

SH: I really didn't start rowing until I was 25. It turns out rowing, besides being great exercise, is easier to fit into growing a family and a career than sailboat racing, if only for the time required. But, once again, my dad was my inspiration. For his 50th birthday, Charles decided to row a dory – not a racing shell – solo from Catalina to Marina del Rey. And from that first trip, the "Great Catalina to Marina del Rey Rowing and Paddling Derby" was launched, as was my rowing career. From these "crossings," as we called them, I teamed up with S/C Craig Leeds for flat water rowing. Rowing single sculls or doubles with Craig, competing in Masters Nationals was a passion for 20 years. We did the Head of the Charles regatta in Boston for 15 years and medaled in 10 of those.

Breeze: How did you balance managing CYC and being an active member?

SH: Forty-seven years ago, I began my career working for LAACO as CYC's Assistant Manager and returned as General Manager in 1983, which was an exciting time for the Club as the '84 Olympics unfolded. Then, in 1989, LAACO sold the Riviera Country Club to a Japanese real estate investor and I was charged with managing the operations through the three-year transition. After Charles retired, I moved back downtown, working as General Manager of the Athletic Club and President of CYC, Inc.

It was a bit of a balancing act, fulfilling my duties at LAACO and CYC while enjoying my membership at the Club and all it had to offer my family. I was fortunate through the many CYC activities to get to know so many wonderful members. Charles, my mentor and supporter, often reminded me that we were stewards of the Club and responsible for its future.

### Breeze: What are some of your most memorable CYC events?

SH: Of course, CYC's involvement in the 1984 Olympic Sailing competition always will be one of my favorite memories, but we've hosted and run so many high-level events over the years, it's hard to pick out just a couple. Certainly, the two Star World Championships (1983 and 2002) and two Olympic Sailing Trials (Tornado in 1992 and Star for 2008) top the list. Rounding out our major sailing achievements, the California Cup regatta has featured iconic boats of their time along with world-famous classes for over 60 years.

As noted earlier, CYC's creation in 1977 of the Catalina to Marina del Rey rowing race established our local dominance of long-distance rowing and launched our adult and junior rowing programs to national prominence. Seeing the growth of our rowing activities alongside racing and cruising at the Club has been extremely rewarding. Our own Head of the Marina regatta now draws well over 100 shells and sculls to compete in this 5.000 meter race.

# Breeze: Where do you see the Club in 2028, when the Olympics are here in L.A. again?

SH: As you know, CYC played a major role in the Olympic sailing events in 1984. Dozens of our members, led by then-Commodore Millard Rosing and then-Rear Commodore Steve Curran, ran the new windsurfer event for these games and we presented all our CYC volunteers with the Signal Service Award for 1984. It is my hope that a new generation of members will get involved in the 2028 Games, not just in the sailing competition, but across all the Olympic sports.

Six years from now, I believe CYC will be operating in a similar capacity, hosting major sailing events and creating activities and programs that appeal to our diverse membership, with renewed focus on young families and their children. Over the years, I've seen interest groups launch successful "startups," creating communities within the Club, and I'm sure that will continue. We do have a lot going for us!

Breeze: What advice would you have for new members joining the Club today?

**SH:** As our 1982 Commodore Howard Ryan always told new members, "Get Involved!" I'd take that a step further: Not only should you get involved in a Club activity that supports your passion, but try something new, an activity you've never done before. Plus, that's how you meet other members and develop lasting relationships and friendships.

### Breeze: Any final thoughts, Steve?

**SH:** First, I'd like to assure our members that the ownership situation will be resolved and the Club will be as strong as ever. People join CYC for a variety of reasons: family experiences, activities for kids, learning to sail or row or play paddle tennis, and not necessarily just for sailboat racing (although that's an important part of our culture). What we will always offer is many opportunities to enjoy our on-the-water lifestyle.

Charles' vision is what we enjoy today, a unique relationship between management and membership, which allows the members to really enjoy the Club and all it has to offer

**Postscript – SH:** I'd like everyone to know how proud I was to be recognized as an Honorary Commodore of CYC and to follow in my father's footsteps. It meant a lot to Charles at

the time he received his recognition, and it really means a lot to me. I feel part of a family legacy and look forward to my sons, Cory, Sterling, and Tyler, who own cruising sailboats, along with my daughter, Julianne, carrying on the family tradition of deep involvement with the California Yacht Club.

Of course, my bride of 17 years, Stephanie, has been by my side through so much of this and has made everything I've done at California Yacht Club more meaningful and, no doubt, more successful. Stephanie has been there for me much like Patty was for Charles. Thank you. •



# The Road to the Melges 24 World Championship Goes through Key West

eam Pacific Yankee is back again, now in a Melges 24. After winning our second National Championship in the Melges IC 37 Class last summer in Newport, Rhode Island, we sold that Pacific Yankee, and then purchased a new Melges 24, hull #865, and transitioned to this highly competitive class. Our immediate goal is to be competitive for the 2022 Worlds to be held in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, mid-May. Our crew for the last two regattas - Morgan Reeser, Federico Michetti, Charlie Smythe, Lara Poljsak (our 92-pound weapon from Slovenia) and myself will be with us through the Worlds. We are also fortunate to have previous Melges 24 World Champion Vince Brun back as our coach.

Our campaign began this fall with events in Pensacola and Miami, where we finished fourth and third, respectively. Our third event was the revived Key West Race Week, now dubbed "The Southernmost Regatta." Anyone who has raced in the old Key West Race Week remembers some amazing sailing conditions along with even better times ashore at this southernmost tip of Florida. One of the benefits of the pandemic has been the disappearance of cruise ships in the Keys, and now the brilliant turquoise water is clearer than ever. This year the regatta featured five TP/Great Lakes 52s, 18 Melges 24s, 11 J/70s, eight J/111s, and six boats racing under ORC.

Key West did not disappoint, providing us with conditions varying from 17-22 knots the first day to only 6-8 knots of breeze on the last day. We thought this event would be a great place to train and tune prior to the Worlds, in which we expect similarly challenging wind and wave conditions. With five days of scheduled racing, the regatta called for 10 races - it was going to be a grueling week.

With many other proven successful Melges 24 teams in the lineup, we knew we'd have our work cut out for us. We



ur Club has been selected by US Sailing to host the 2022 U.S. Junior Women's Singlehanded and Doublehanded Championships in late July. The is the first time that these two national championships have been combined in one event, and we are honored to welcome young single-handed and double-handed racers to CYC for two days of clinics organized by US Sailing July 21-22, followed by two days of championship racing July 23-24.

The ILCA 6 (Laser Radial) class will compete in the U.S. Junior Women's

Championship for the Leiter Trophy, while the U.S. Junior Women's Doublehanded Championship for the Ida Lewis Trophy will feature the Club 420 and 29er classes. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, these championship regattas were last contested in 2019, with CYC's Katharine Doble and Zoey Ziskind of Santa Barbara YC winning the Ida Lewis Trophy for their first-place finish in the 2019 Doublehanded Championship.

CYC is no stranger to the Singlehanded Championship, having hosted the silver anniversary event in 2005. Back then, members housed the young competitors at their homes, chauffeured them to and from the Club for racing, and introduced them to Southern California. In today's era, we will welcome approximately 120 competitors to the Club and our waters, but will not be responsible for arranging housing. We'll offer our traditional CYC hospitality, great racing in two separate racing areas on Santa Monica Bay, and a warm welcome. We'll need many volunteers on and off the water, and look forward to working together to produce a memorable regatta for the competitors, our members, and the Club.  $\checkmark$

he 2021 Bahamas Optimist Nationals was delayed from 2021 to late January 2022 due to COVID-19 precautions. I was fortunate to be one of the few sailors from the USODA Optimist Development Team that was invited to this event. This was my first time visiting and sailing in the Bahamas, and it was an incredible experience.

The Optimist Development Program (ODP2) held a clinic for three days before the regatta. The wind was between 9 and 12 knots for the first three days and then proceeded to quickly

pick up to around 25 knots, gusting to 30 knots, for the weekend due to an incoming northeast storm. Although my experience in heavy wind is limited, this was a fun event in a beautiful venue.

The first three days spent training with ODP2 were very eventful and full of exciting drills. My coaches for this regatta gave me a lot of helpful advice and taught me techniques and ways I could improve my skills. We practiced to the far right of the bridge between Nassau and Paradise Island. The water was pretty flat and the wind came in

unexpected shifts with many puffs and lulls. The first day of practice started out with a race. Then we divided into three groups, splitting the team of 21 sailors into seven per group (the first seven, middle seven, and last seven sailors to finish). We then proceeded to do drills in our groups with one of the coaches. Towards the end of the practice, we raced with our whole team and some of the Bahamian sailors. This routine was repeated for the next two days of practice where we split into our groups of seven and did drills followed by races for the rest of the day.

The first day of the regatta was unfortunately canceled

because of the weather conditions. A storm appearing in the northeast created high winds of 25 to 30 knots, gusting 30 to 35 knots, before lessening. By the time the regatta was canceled, after postponing for hours, it was around 2:15 p.m. so our team decided to go out and each sailor was given the choice to sail or not. The wind had decreased since the morning, but it was still an excellent opportunity to practice in heavy wind. We only practiced for about 30 minutes in the strong winds. I really enjoyed practicing in the heavy wind because I was able to work

on my technique and hiking.

The next and final day of the regatta was spent sailing six races. The wind was around 15 knots, not as strong as the day before. But the wind was extremely unpredictable with many shifts, puffs, and lulls due to the race course being between Paradise Island and Nassau, forcing the wind to go around the buildings on the islands. Because of the oscillating winds and large shifts, I started on the boat end of the starting line for the majority of the races. This seemed to work out well because the current was pushing towards the pin which opened up a spot next to the

seemed to work out well because the current was pushing towards the pin which opened up a spot next to the boat. During the races, I tried to play the shifts and sail in pressure. If I started under some boats or got pinched off, I would tack and try to get clear air. I maintained this strategy for all of my races. I was able to finish strong with a third place in the last race.

I finished as Top Girl and ninth place overall. Congratulations to my teammates from the U.S. who did really well. This regatta was a very fun experience and I was able to learn a lot. Thank you to my parents and my coaches for supporting me and helping me always improve in sailing. I really enjoyed spending time in the Bahamas and hope to visit again.  $\clubsuit$

At CYC, you can bank on the Seder being short and sweet, and the dinner being delicious (including





# **Happy Hour Book Club Loved "The Rose Code"**

January read, was thoroughly enjoyed by the members. This intricately plotted story brings together three very different women



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who were recruited to work at Bletchley Park, the top-secret home of England's World War II codebreakers. Osla is a Canadian-born debutante who moves in the highest social circles and is fluent in German; Mab is a child of East-End London poverty; and Beth is the repressed daughter of an extremely religious mother. Mab is a skilled mechanic; Beth is a genius at puzzles. Bunking together at Beth's home, the three become close during the war.

Quinn is a very skillful writer who draws her characters with seeming ease and gives them remarkable depth. The story has many twists and turns, as the three women live with the incredible pressure of the work and the need to keep what they do absolutely secret. By the end of the war the three friends were torn apart only to be reunited later to solve the mystery of a co-worker who became a traitor at Bletchley Park.

Two of the characters are based on the lives of actual people, notably Canadian-born debutante Osla Benning, who enjoyed a two-year romance with Prince Philip of Greece (later husband of Queen Elizabeth), and Valerie Glassborrow, grandmother of Kate Middleton (Duchess of Cambridge), who worked at Bletchley Park as a code breaker. The rest are fictional but drawn from composites of people who worked at Bletchley Park.

Sue Moore led our discussion, which concluded that this book is a really good read and we highly recommend it. Our next book will be "Cloud Cuckoo Land," by Anthony Doerr, on February 16, followed by "The Code Breaker," by Walter Isaacson, on March 17. Times and moderators to be announced.

# "Harlem Shuffle," A Novel by Colson Whitehead

olson Whitehead appears to be a favorite author of the Book Mates group. "Harlem Shuffle" is the third book that we have read by Whitehead in the last five or six years. It's certainly lighter fare than "The Nickel Boys" and "The Underground Railroad," both historical pieces. Yet "Shuffle" is also a period piece, set in NYC's legendary Harlem of the late 1950s.

The protagonist, Ray Carney, is an up-and-coming entrepreneur, owner of Carney's Furniture Store, basically a one-man operation. Dedicated to serving his Black clientele, Carney is eager to succeed in legitimate business and to get out from under the reputation of his now-dead father, an infamous local hoodlum. A devoted husband and father, Carney is determined to provide a stable and secure haven for his family as opposed to the chaos of his own childhood. However, Carney is also a realist, and business is tough and slow. He's not above moving, as a "fence," or selling occasional stolen TVs, stereos, radios, or appliances, just to pay the bills of his "real" business. Carney won't steal, but he will help relocate items to a nice, new home.


It's these recurring forays into the business netherworld that lay the groundwork for the three action sequences in the book. The first event describes the daring late-night heist of the premier hotel in Harlem, the Theresa. Carney knows nothing of the robbery, but he gets thrust into the thick of it when his blabbermouth cousin, Freddie, volunteers Carney as the perfect fence to dispose of high-interest items such as fine jewelry.


Carney doesn't want to be a gangster, but somehow it comes knocking at his door.

In the second action sequence, Carney instigates the event. In his fervor to join a local successful businessmen's club, Carney follows all the rules, some written and some not. Then, cheated and disrespected by a club member, and ultimately denied membership, Carney vows revenge, and no law is too great to defeat him. There is no bloodshed, but Carney does have his way. Moral: Do not cross the son of "Big Mike" Carney.

Again, trouble comes looking for Carney when his drugaddicted cousin Freddie, the blabbermouth, seeks Carney's help in a vendetta between Freddie and the scion of a very wealthy, very white, prestigious founding father of NYC. Murder and mayhem ensue. Carney's loyalty is admirable; its placement is not.

Thanks to the deft workings of moderator Sue Moore, the constant backdrop of social justice was woven into the fabric of our discussion. The killing of a Black child by a white Harlem cop culminated in massive riots within the community. Paying for justice was featured prominently; little cash-filled envelopes provided by Black businessmen into the hands of white Harlem cops was de rigueur.


